HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

PURPOSE: To establish requirements for earning a high school diploma.

The mission of the District, in partnership with the community, is to provide exemplary educational programs and services that prepare students to be productive citizens in our democratic society. The following high school requirements encompass the knowledge, skills, and experiences needed to develop the essential habits of a productive citizen, which include habits of character, communication, citizenship, mind, self-direction, collaboration, wellness, and productivity.

A. Graduation Requirements For Comprehensive And Alternative High Schools.

1.0 COURSE DISCIPLINES (Successful Completion)	GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
1.1 Language Arts	Eight semesters of English Language Arts
1.2 Mathematics	A minimum of 4 semesters of mathematics which must include: Math 1
1.3 Sciences	Four semesters of science to include: Two semesters of physical science, and Two semesters of biological science

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1.0 COURSE DISCIPLINES (Successful Completion)	GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
1.4 Social Sciences	 Seven semesters of social science to include: One semester of Ethnic Studies (effective for students who will be graduating in the 2029 – 2030 school year and subsequent school years) Two semesters of World History, and Two semesters of United States History, and During the senior year, one semester of American Government and one semester of Economics
1.5 Physical Education	 <u>Eight semesters</u> of Physical Education to include: Four semesters of Core PE Four semesters of PE electives A modified Physical Education program will be provided for those students who are not able to participate in Physical Education due to illness or other impairments. The Board directs the Superintendent to establish clear guidelines for any exemptions in the PE requirement.
1.6 Health	 One semester of health science The Board directs the Superintendent or designee to establish clear guidelines for any exemptions or waivers of the health requirement.
1.7 Academic Breadth	 Four semesters of any combination of the courses listed below: World Language Visual/Performing Art CTE Course/Focus on College & Career Course Two semesters of any of the above, plus one of the following: An additional year of science (3rd year) An additional year of math (3rd year) One year of English or math intervention

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2.0 OTHER REQUIREMENTS	GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
2.1 Credit Requirements	Completion of 230 credits of work at five units per subject per semester with grade of "D" or better.
2.2 Early Graduation	 The Board directs the Superintendent or designee to establish guidelines for early graduation. Before October 1, a candidate for early graduation must complete and submit for approval the Early Graduation Petition (Exhibit No. 6146.1).
2.3 Senior Class Schedule	A senior student must enroll <u>in at least five academic classes each semester</u> , one of which must be American Government/Economics and the other four academic courses must be approved by the principal or designee.

B. General High School Regulations.

1.	Earning Credits Through Alternative Education	Independent study high school/Clovis Online School credits will be earned at the rate of one credit for 16 hours of productive work through packets or Edgenuity Curriculum or other approved online curriculum.
2.	Parent Conferences	The high school administration will establish procedures for holding conferences with the student, the classroom teacher, and parent and/or guardian, for those students who are performing below the competency level. This conference shall include a discussion of the assessment and description of the remedial program.
3.	Diploma Policy	Diplomas will be issued to all students who have successfully completed unit, course competency and related requirements at the conclusion of their fourth year of high school. Students who meet the requirements before the conclusion of the fourth year may petition to receive their diplomas early.

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4. Commencement Exercises	All students who have qualified for a diploma and who are in "good standing" as determined by the principal are eligible for commencement exercises.
	Commencement ceremonies will be scheduled at the end of the spring semester. Students completing the required graduation requirements after seven semesters of work and who complete the early graduation process shall be offered the opportunity to be awarded their diploma in a ceremony in the principal's office at the close of the seventh semester.
5. Transfers	To Alternative Education: For students transferring into continuation classes from regular classes, grades and credits earned as of the date of transfer shall be transferred to continuation classes.

C. Vocational Competency Certificate Program For Special Education Students.

The Vocational Competency Certificate Program (VCCP) is a course of study option for special education students which leads to graduation with a Vocational Competency Certificate. The VCCP is intended for students with a current Individualized Education Program (IEP) and recommended by their IEP team upon entering high school in the ninth-grade year or no later than the beginning of the eleventh grade. The outcome of the VCCP provides students with the skills necessary for employability and self-sufficiency within the community.

1.1 Language Arts	 <u>Eight semesters</u> of Vocational English, or Four semesters of Vocational English and Four semesters of ACE English, or Four semesters of Vocational English and four semesters of General Education English
1.2 Mathematics	 <u>Eight semesters</u> of Vocational Mathematics, or Four semesters of Vocational Mathematics and four semesters of ACE Math, or Four semesters of Vocational Mathematics and four semesters of General Education mathematics

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1.0 COURSE DISCIPLINES (Successful Completion)	GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
1.3 Transition	Eight semesters of Transition to include: Two semesters of Personal Transition, Two semesters of Career Transition, Two semesters of Life Transition, Two semesters of Accessing the Community
1.4 Health	Two semesters of Vocational Health, or RSP Health/Geography, or General Education Health Elective
1.5 Physical Education	Eight semesters of Physical Education to include: Four semesters of Core PE Four semesters of PE electives
	 A modified Physical Education program or Adapted Physical Education program (APE) will be provided for those students as determined by their IEP.
	The Board shall direct the Superintendent to establish clear guidelines for any exemptions in the Physical Education Requirement.
1.6 Life/Career Path Emphasis	 <u>Four semesters</u> of a combination of Vocational Academics, ROP, CTE and/or Work Experience <u>Two semesters</u> of Vocational Lifestyles
1.7 Academic Breadth	<u>Six semesters</u> of RSP or General Education classes in Science, Social Science, Foreign Language, Visual and Performing Arts, Language Arts and/or Math Intervention.

2.0 OTHER REQUIREMEN	TS GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
2.1 Credit Requirement	Completion of 230 credits of work at five units per subject per semester with a grade of "D" or better.
2.2 Early Graduation	The Board directs the Superintendent or designee to establish guidelines for early graduation. Before October 1 st , a candidate for early graduation must complete and submit for approval the Early Graduation petition (Exhibit No. 6146.1).

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2.0 OTHER REQUIREMENTS	GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
2.3 Senior Class Schedule	A senior student must enroll in at least five academic classes each semester, one of which must be Accessing the Community and the other academic courses must be approved by the student's IEP team.
2.4 Vocational Certificate Policy	The certificate will be issued to all students who have successfully completed unit, course competency and the four-year experience requirements. The competencies are based on the Department of Labor Secretaries' Commission on Achieving Necessary Skills (SCANS) and California State Standards.
2.5 Commencement Exercises	Based on Education Code sections 56390 and 56391, students with an Individualized Education Program who have completed an alternative course of study approved by the Board are entitled to graduate with a certificate as specified by the Board. The students are also eligible to participate in any graduation ceremony and any school activity related to graduation as long as it meets all other requirements of being a student in good standing with their school.

D. Exemptions from District-Adopted Graduation Requirements.

District students are required to complete graduation course requirements specified above, including the requirements imposed by Education Code section 51225.3 and those adopted by the Board. However, a foster youth, homeless student, former juvenile court school student, child of a military family, or migrant student who transfers into the District or between District schools any time after completing the second year of high school, or a newly arrived immigrant student who is in the third or fourth year of high school and is participating in a newcomer program, shall be exempted from any graduation requirements adopted by the Board that are in addition to statewide course requirements. This exemption shall not apply if the Superintendent or designee makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to complete the requirements in time to graduate by the end of the fourth year of high school. Within 30 days of the transfer or of the commencement of participation in a newcomer program, as applicable, the Superintendent or designee shall notify any eligible student of the availability of the exemption and whether the student qualifies for it. (Education Code 51225.1)

E. Retroactive Diplomas.

Any student who completed grade 12 in the 2003-04 through 2014-15 school year and met all applicable graduation requirements other than the passage of the high school exit examination shall

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be granted a high school diploma. (Education Code 51413)

In addition, the District may retroactively grant high school diplomas to: (Education Code 48204.4, 51430, 51440)

1. Persons who departed California against their will while in grade 12 and did not receive a diploma because the departure interrupted their education, provided that they were in good academic standing at the time of the departure.

Persons may be considered to have departed California against their will if they were in custody of a government agency and were transferred to another state, were subject to a lawful order from a court or government agency that authorized their removal from California, were subject to a lawful order and were permitted to depart California before being removed from California pursuant to the lawful order, were removed or were permitted to depart voluntarily pursuant to the federal Immigration and Nationality Act, or departed due to other circumstances determined by the district that are consistent with the purposes of Education Code section 48204.4.

In determining whether to award a diploma under these circumstances, the Superintendent or designee shall consider any coursework that may have been completed outside of the United States or through online or virtual courses.

2. Former students who were interned by order of the federal government during World War II or who are honorably discharged veterans of World War II, the Korean War, or the Vietnam War, provided that they were enrolled in a District school immediately preceding the internment or military service and did not receive a diploma because their education was interrupted due to the internment or military service in those wars.

Deceased former students who satisfy these conditions may be granted a retroactive diploma to be received by their next of kin.

3. Veterans who entered the military service of the United States while in grade 12 and who had satisfactorily completed the first half of the work required for grade 12 in a District school.

F. Honorary Diplomas.

The Board may grant an honorary high school diploma to: (Education Code 51225.5)

- 1. An international exchange student who has not completed the course of study ordinarily required for graduation and who is returning to the home country following the completion of one academic school year in the District.
- 2. A student who is terminally ill.

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The honorary diploma shall be clearly distinguishable from the regular diploma of graduation awarded by the District. (Education Code 51225.5)
